What is Project SHARE?

PROVIDING ACCESS TO MEDICINE

Project SHARE (Supplying Hemophilia Aid and Relief) is a humanitarian program of Save One Life. SHARE donates factor, a crucial blood clotting medicine, to patients with bleeding disorders in developing countries, and to the hospitals and nonprofit organizations that support them.



History

Founded by Laureen A. Kelley in 2002 as a program of LA Kelley Communications, donations have:

- prevented crippling, pain and death
- allowed students to return to school
- attracted rural patients to urban clinics for treatment and education
- supported life-saving surgeries and physical therapy
- empowered patients and families to create hemophilia societies where none existed

SINCE 2002, SHARE HAS DONATED MORE THAN 167 MILLION UNITS AND 9,745 MG OF FACTOR TO THOUSANDS OF PATIENTS IN 77 DEVELOPING COUNTRIES.



Project Description

Project SHARE ensures that tens of millions of dollars worth of factor, which would otherwise be destroyed, reaches impoverished people with bleeding disorders. This factor comes mainly from US patients who switch products, hemophilia treatment centers (HTCs), and specialty pharmacies with excess inventory.

Access to factor varies greatly in developing countries. However, over 75% of patients around the world still have little to no access to medication. Project SHARE was created to help patients in emergency situations by providing factor to save lives and limbs threatened by a bleeding episode.

Our Goals and Objectives

Despite Project SHARE's continued efforts, our inventory of factor often varies. Project SHARE tries to fulfill each request we receive by working with partners in the pharmaceutical industry, specialty pharmacies and other nonprofits.


